### COVID-19 update

## VAMHN Data Directory

We are currently in the process of developing an online Data Directory of quantitative data resources that include information on violence / abuse and mental health to help guide researchers, policy makers, practitioners, survivors / survivor organisations and the third sector toward useful resources available in the field. For this directory, we are interested in gathering information in a set format on three types of resource: 1) Datasets 2) Data Repositories 3) Aggregate / Published Statistics.

**AVA** (Against Violence and Abuse) have launched their AVIVA Crowdfunding Campaign, aiming to raise funds to create a trauma informed digital tool that provides practical support that recognises past abuse but gives women hope for the future. It differs from existing online support as it will be trauma informed and recognises the abuse they have experienced. This is truly innovative as it is co-designed by women with lived experience, ensuring it addresses the issues they face. AVA are aiming to raise £5000 to further develop this tool from a prototype. ## Job and Education Opportunities

**Coventry University** are recruiting a clinician with an interest in sexual violence research to join the [MESEARCH project's](#) Data Monitoring and Ethics Committee. The safety, rights and well-being of the study participants are paramount and the role of the three-member DMEC is to monitor study data and make recommendations to the study advisory on whether there are any ethical or safety reasons why the MESARCH studies should not continue. They are welcoming clinicians from any area/discipline to join the meetings which are held annually, can be attended remotely and are arranged/facilitated by the research team at Coventry University. **The University of Edinburgh** are offering a fully-funded PhD studentship starting in September to work on the follow-up of Young Carers (3-wave longitudinal study in South Africa) and investigate the impact of government-level interventions on the link between adverse childhood experiences and adult mental health. This is an advanced quantitative methods scholarship so candidates must be wanting to engage with advanced quantitative methods. ### **Differences in adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and quality of physical and mental health between transgender and cisgender sexual minorities. – Schnarrs et al, 2019**

This article explores the difference in the prevalence of ACEs in sexual and gender minorities. They found that transgender participants reported emotional abuse, physical neglect and emotional neglect more frequently compared to cisgender and LGB individuals.
