## **VAMHN Opportunities**

#### End of Network videos – measurement, understanding and interventions

We've had a wonderful 4 years of the VAMHN funded by the UKRI and have amassed over 1,200 amazing members from around the world, all with expertise in the field of violence, abuse and mental health. To showcase some of the work we've done during this time, we're releasing a series of videos and resources over the coming month.

Over the past few weeks, we've been tweeting all about the work we've done under the three themes of the network under the hashtags #MeasuringVAMH #UnderstandingVAMH and #VAMHinterventions. You can follow along and tag us @VAMHN.

We've also launched a series of videos from the project teams who were awarded up to £25k for their research projects under each theme. ## Other Training, Events and Opportunities

The ADR UK Conference 2023 in partnership with the Office for National Statistics (ONS) will take place around the theme "Public data for resilience and inclusion: Using administrative data to inform policy and practice in challenging times". The conference will take place on the 14<sup>th</sup>-16<sup>th</sup> November 2023. Abstract submissions will close on 17<sup>th</sup> April 2023. To find out more click here.

The 16th Equality, Diversity and Inclusion International Conference (EDI) will take place at City, University of London on the 10<sup>th</sup>-11<sup>th</sup> July 2023. The deadline for abstract submission is 24<sup>th</sup> April 2023. To find out more click here.

At this conference, Dr Ladan Hashemi and colleagues will be running a session on "Investigating the intersections of disability and gender in experience of violence". They are inviting long abstracts (up to 1500 words), developmental papers (up to 4,000 words), as well as full papers (up to 6,000 words) to this session. They invite papers on the prevalence, risk and protective factors and wider context of violence among disabled people. Intersections of disability with gender, age and socioeconomic context in the experience of violence are of particular interest as are studies on the perpetrators/perpetration of violence against disabled people. They also encourage submission of papers that focus on evaluating theories, policies, services and interventions that address violence against disabled people. # Ongoing research

VAMHN LEAG Coordinator Lisa Ward is looking to co-produce an ethical framework for engaging people with Lived Experience in research. If you would like to contribute to developing this, you can access the Padlet <u>here</u> and add your thoughts.

Megan Webb is a trainee clinical psychologist at Canterbury Christ Church University and is looking to speak to women who have experienced domestic abuse in adulthood about their experiences of navigating adult mental health services. She is hoping to meet with a further 5-8 women who have accessed secondary care mental health services. The study aims to explore what is helpful and unhelpful about current mental healthcare provision and how things might need to change to better serve the needs of survivors. She would like to hear from domestic abuse services, third-sector organisations or individuals who would be interested in supporting recruitment and/or participation to the project. Participants will receive a £10 gift voucher for their time and travel expenses up to £10 will be reimbursed. Asking the Right Questions? A Critical Overview of Longitudinal Survey Data on Intimate Partner Violence and Abuse Among Adults and Young People in the UK – Skafida, Feder & Barter, 2023

In this paper, the authors undertook a critical analysis of UK longitudinal and repeated crosssectional population surveys which asked about experiences of intimate partner violence and abuse (IPVA). To read the full article published in the Journal of Family Violence click here.

### Association Between Men's Exposure to Intimate Partner Violence and Self-reported Health Outcomes in New Zealand – Mellar et al, 2023
