Research Update:

Members of our parent network, VAMHN, published a <u>realist review</u> of psychosocial interventions to improve the mental health of women survivors of intimate partner violence survivors.

The Lancet Psychiatry published a Commission on intimate partner violence (IPV) and mental health.

A <u>study</u> published in *The Lancet* using the WHO Global Database on Prevalence of Violence Against Women found a lifetime global prevalence of physical and/or sexual IPV of 27% and past-year prevalence of 13%. Prevalence was higher among younger women and in low-income countries.

A new <u>review article</u> summarises what is known about the relationship between domestic violence and abuse and mental health during COVID-19.

Harise Stein publishes a monthly newsletter summarising the latest research on different forms of abuse. The archive is **online**, where you can sign up to receive them to your inbox.
