# **■VAMHN Opportunities**

## Exciting announcement – the VAMHN is running for one more year!

We are incredibly excited to announce that the VAMHN has secured additional funding from new sources and will be running for another year! We're super excited to continue connecting with our amazing members until 2024. Our activities for the VAMHN's upcoming fifth year will centre around the theme of Coercive Control.

Coercive control sits at the heart of domestic abuse and intimate partner violence, but also plays a central role in many other forms of violence and abuse. Around the world, too little is known about the mechanics and nuances of this highly manipulative form of abuse. Estimates of coercive control have risen year-on-year, with 41,626 offences of coercive control recorded by the police in England and Wales in 2022. However, this figure is a conservative estimate of the problem, given most people do not report their experience to the police.

One of the grants to VAMHN is provided by global business leader, Cristiana Falcone, and her team at the BECS Foundation, which aims to spearhead academic and clinical research into coercive control in the UK. Falcone has 20 years of experience advising global corporations on the boards of Revlon and Viacom, and international governmental organizations including the World Economic Forum. Since 2006, she has served as CEO and trustee of the JMCMRJ Sorrell Foundation, leading transformative global initiatives in health, education and poverty reduction.

**Cristiana Falcone commented:** 'Across our global society, domestic abuse is a serious intergenerational issue, and one we have a fundamental duty to address. I am honoured to lend my support to King's College London and the VAMHN as leading organisations that are committed to enhancing our understanding of the critical early warning signs. My hope is that we can be even better equipped to stop cases of coercive control and domestic abuse in their tracks.'

Professor Helen Fisher, Professor of Developmental Psychopathology at King's College London and co-leader of the Network, commented: 'Coercive control and domestic abuse

are critical social issues which demand truly pro-active, interdisciplinary action. We believe strongly in the potential of the pioneering research that those with lived experience, researchers, clinicians, and other members of the VAMHN are leading, and are extremely thankful for the support of advocates such as Cristiana, which is essential to progress this vital work.'

Over the next year, the VAMHN will continue to run the platforms and activities you've been engaging with over the past 4 years, as well as developing some new opportunities for all our members to get involved with. Some of the upcoming activities we've got planned include:

- Recruiting new members of our Lived Experience Advisory Group to strengthen the VAMHN's activities.
- Hosting webinars to share learnings on the challenges and opportunities around tackling coercive control.
- Launching our new podcast series on coercive control called "Pulling the Strings".
- Continuing to send out our monthly newsletters, tweeting from our twitter account (@VAMHN), hosting our online forum and updating our website.

There will be loads of exciting opportunities for get involved with our upcoming activities this year, and we'll be sure to keep you updated through our newsletter and twitter account.

#### **Survivors' Voices Researcher Network**

Are you a researcher with lived experience of any kind of abuse or trauma? Whether you work in research now, hope to soon, are a student, participant, or co-producer the Survivors' Voices Researcher Network may be relevant to you. This Network was created by Survivors' Voices and is funded by the VAMHN. It is a peer led educational exchange and support network which meets for one hour, monthly on zoom.

When we research subjects close to personal traumatic experiences aspects of the process can cause unexpected triggering. Knowing how best to work with these, learn to selfcare and support our traumatised participants can be a work in progress. Even those who support us in academic or institutional contexts may not understand or appreciate the painful struggles survivors face: peers, however, often do. Our shared histories make frank, honest and empathic support possible. Members benefit from the transfer of learning and solutions to difficulties, practical or emotional in every meeting.

The meetings offer a space to share present moment challenges, and triumphs! We discuss best practice and we invite guest speakers. The Network is run in accordance with the

Survivors' Voices Charter for Survivor Engagement which places safety, transparency, equality and respect at its heart. ## **End of Network videos – Arts Competition Projects**

We've had a wonderful 4 years of the VAMHN funded by the UKRI and have amassed over 1,200 amazing members from around the world, all with expertise in the field of violence, abuse and mental health. To showcase some of the work we've done during this time, we are releasing a series of videos and resources from our network members.

Our most recent video series showcases the work of the five project teams we funded as part of the VAMHN Arts Competition. In 2021 we launched our fourth funding competition to provide awards of up to £15,000 to artistic public engagement projects that sought to further the public discussion around violence, abuse and mental health.
