Recent Activities

- Our network lead Prof Louise Howard was the keynote speaker at the [Pathfinder Mental Health Event](#) on 23rd May. The day brought together third sector members, researchers, practitioners and survivors to discuss domestic abuse in the context of mental health care.
- Our network lead Dr Sian Oram and network coordinator Anjuli Kaul attended the Inaugural Symposium of the [King's Health Partners Institute for Women's and Children's Health](#) on 10th June, with presentations on research, policy and healthcare and a poster viewing session showcasing women and children's health research across the UK.
- On the 18th and 19th June the VAMHN hosted workshops on the measurement of violence, abuse, and mental health. The first day was run by Prof. Sylvia Walby and the second by Dr Emma Howarth. A huge thank you to them and to everyone who attended.
- On the 21st June, and to mark the formation of the VAMHN, The Lancet Psychiatry has launched a Commission on violence, abuse and mental health, centred on domestic violence. To find out more [click here](#).

We will be making awards of up to £25,000 and proposals should address issues of measurement and definition in relation to violence, abuse, and mental health. 'Let's Talk Mental Health: Series 2' by the Mental Health Leadership

Let's Talk Mental Health is a video series of that aims to promote discussion, reduce stigma and increase knowledge of mental health. 'Changes in Psychiatric and Medical Conditions and Health Care Utilization Following a Diagnosis of Sexual Assault: A Retrospective Cohort Study' by Young-Wolff et al

This article looks at the relationship between sexual assault and health care utilisation. They found that patients with a sexual assault diagnosis had a higher prevalence of psychiatric and medical comorbidities and greater health care utilisation than the 12 months before the sexual assault diagnosis. 'Sexual violence Against Older People: A Review of Empirical Literature' by Hannah Bows

This article presents a critical review of the literature reporting empirical research in three overlapping fields of inquiry: elder abuse, domestic violence, and sexual violence. The

SafeLives are working on a project gathering the voices of men and boys. This work forms a crucial part of their new strategy, helping them to look at the whole picture – and whole society – when it comes to domestic abuse. They're launching two surveys:
